## Set recipe for Class 87: Date \& Walnut Cake

## Ingredients

- $100 \mathrm{~g} / 3 ½ 0 z$ unsalted butter, diced and softened, plus extra for greasing
- $250 \mathrm{~g} / 9 \mathrm{oz}$ soft dates, pitted and roughly chopped
- $150 \mathrm{ml} / 5 \mathrm{fl}$ oz boiling water
- 1 tsp instant coffee granules
- $75 \mathrm{~g} / 2120 \mathrm{oz}$ caster sugar
- $55 \mathrm{~g} / 2$ oz dark muscovado sugar
- 2 medium free-range eggs, lightly beaten
- $225 \mathrm{~g} / 8$ oz self-raising flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- pinch of salt
- $100 \mathrm{~g} / 31 / 2$ oz walnuts, roughly chopped
- 1 tbsp demerara sugar

Method

1. Preheat the oven to $180 \mathrm{C} / 160$ C Fan/Gas 4 . Grease a $900 \mathrm{~g} / 2 \mathrm{lb}$ loaf tin and line the base and ends with a strip of buttered baking paper.
2. Combine the butter, dates, boiling water and instant coffee granules in a large mixing bowl. Mix to combine and leave for 30 minutes for the butter to melt and the dates to soften.
3. Add the caster and dark muscovado sugar to the date mixture, stirring well to combine and to dissolve any lumpy brown sugar. Add the beaten eggs and mix again to combine.
4. Sift the flour, baking powder and a pinch of salt into the bowl and mix until smooth. Add all but 1 tablespoon of the chopped walnuts and mix again. Scoop the mixture into the prepared tin, spread level and scatter the remaining walnuts and demerara sugar over the top.
5. Bake on the middle shelf of the preheated oven for 30 minutes, then reduce the oven temperature to 170C/150C Fan/Gas 3 and cook for a further 25-30 minutes, or until a wooden skewer inserted into the middle of the cake comes out clean. If the cake is browning too quickly, loosely cover the top with foil or baking paper.
6. Remove the cake from the oven, leave in the tin for $3-4$ minutes, then carefully lift out of the tin and leave on a wire cooling rack until completely cooled.

TOP TRAY AWARD (Class 1) - Collection of 3 types of vegetable $1^{\text {st }} £ 10.00 / 2^{\text {nd }} £ 5.00 / 3^{\text {rd }} £ 3.00$
a) Display of three types of vegetables from the following list. The quantity of each type of vegetable required for display is given in brackets;
Carrots (3), Cauliflower (2), Onions (3), Parsnips (3), Peas (6), Potatoes (3), Runner Beans (6), Tomatoes (6).
Each individual type of vegetable will be judged to a total of 20 points split into three as follows; 7 points for size, shape and colour; 7 points for condition; 6 points for uniformity.
b) Vegetables must be displayed within an area measuring 18 " by 24 " without bending any part of them. No part of any exhibit may exceed the size of the tray. A tray or board measuring 18 " by 24 " can be used to display the vegetables or the area can be marked on the staging. When a tray has a lip or edge it must not exceed 18 " by 24 ".
c) A black cloth is permitted \& the tray may be painted. Parsley is permitted for garnishing but no other foliage or accessories will be allowed. Onion tops may be tied or whipped using raffia.

KITCHING (BUILDERS) TROPHY - Best exhibit in Class 2: Collection of 4 types of vegetable $1^{\text {st }}$ $£ 3.00 / 2^{\text {nd }} £ 2.00 / 3^{\text {rd }} £ 1.00$

TOP VASE AWARD (Class 33)- Mixed vase of home-grown flowers (open to everyone, not just those who grow for show). $1^{\text {st }} £ 10.00 / 2^{\text {nd }} £ 5.00 / 3^{\text {rd }} £ 3.00$
a) Mixed vase of flowers containing a total of between 5 \& 10 stems taken from a minimum of two different kinds of flower, not two varieties of the same kind.
b) The display will be judged out of a total of 35 points split into; 25 points for the colour, form, condition, quality \& freshness of the flowers on display \& 10 points for the overall presentation \& effect of the plants in the vase. The vase will be viewed from all directions.
c) Plants used in the display should be showing flowers only; no seed heads or berries are allowed.
d) The vase can be any shape \& size \& made from any material, but must be in proportion to the display. No marks are awarded for the vase itself.
e) No accessories allowed e.g. bows and additional foliage. Foliage which is growing naturally from the flowering stem \& still attached to the stem will be allowed. Packing material including oasis, is allowed to keep the stems in place
